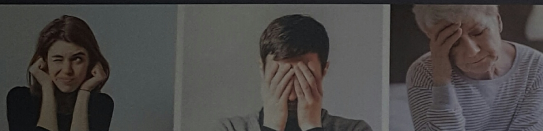


Ringing in the Ears

Adults with untreated hearing loss tend to withdraw from engaging with family and friends.



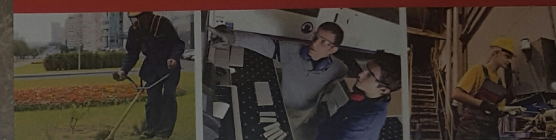
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Occupational Hearing Loss



Approximately 30 million workers are exposed to hazardous levels of noise on the job. Another 3 million are at risk for hearing loss from other agents such as solvents and metals.

How quickly hearing loss takes place depends on the intensity of the noise, its duration, and how often the exposure occurs.

You do not get used to noise; you gradually lose your hearing. Once hearing is damaged, it cannot be repaired or replaced.

According to the World Health Organization (W.H.O.), hearing loss also has potentially devastating consequences for physical and mental health, education and employment.

Constant exposure to noise over 85 dB can cause hearing damage.

Hearing Protection devices include:

- Ear plugs
- Ear muffs
- Canal caps
