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Introduction

Human Understanding Measured Across National (HUMAN) Surveys combines multiple sources of public opinion data and creates commonly formatted variables. It does not conduct these surveys and using this data also requires citing the original sources and in some cases obtaining their permission. The data cannot be used for commercial purposes and attempts must not be made to identify individual respondents. The resource is being made available for replication studies and as a tool for other researchers. Analysing multiple data sources requires contending with different survey designs and methods. There are also some duplicated national surveys between the different sources because some share data. Users should consult the original source technical documents and field reports. The data is being provided as close as possible to its original format and it is up to each user to decide on the most appropriate methods for analysing and using this resource.

Respondent Data

This dataset provides respondent level data. This means each observation is an individual person answering questions on a survey. This makes the dataset very large and generating models with millions of respondents can take considerable time. For faster or exploratory analysis users may wish to download the Country-Survey Data [\(REF\)](#), which retains scores for all surveys, or the Country-Year Data [\(REF\)](#), which can be merged with other country-year datasets.

Included Variables

Original variables have been recoded for consistency and included alongside common variables, enabling users to combine the data in different ways. This version of HUMAN Surveys focuses on a limited set of variables for social trust, democracy, elections, respondent demographics, and data identification. This codebook explains the following common and recoded variables.

Survey Sources

Analysing more respondents, countries, and surveys provides greater variation and enables answering new research questions. Combining data from multiple sources enables us to track trends over time, repeat models across different surveys, and increase both the reliability and generalisability of findings. HUMAN Surveys aims to make this kind of research a little bit easier for others to undertake. This version combines respondent data from the following survey sources.

Naming Conventions

Variable names try to follow some conventions for clarity and consistency. Prefixes with underscores are used to group variables by type or topic, as summarised in Table 1. These prefixes are then followed by a three-digit number. The first number groups variables by survey item, while the two remaining numbers indicate the response scale. If these last two numbers are 99, then it indicates the number of possible responses or the variable values are over 100. Finally, a letter is added at the end of recoded original variables to distinguish between different versions of survey items with the same number of responses. There is usually no logic or meaning to these suffix letters and they are used sequentially as needed. Suffix letters are not used with common variables. Some examples: all variables starting with 'sd_1' represent respondent age; the common age variable is 'sd_103' and it uses three age categories; 'sd_106a' is a recoded version of age with six categories, and 'sd_199a' is a recoded version of age in years.

Missing Values

All non-valid or unusable responses were recoded into four common missing values wherever possible, which are outlined with example responses in Table 2. The first two (do not know, refused) are active replies from the respondents indicating that they were asked the question but did not provide a valid answer. The second two (not applicable, missing) indicate that the respondents were either not asked the question or that it is not possible to otherwise classify the missing data.

Social Trust

These survey items measure respondent trust of other people in their country.

at_002 | Social Trust (Common)

This common variable distinguishes between respondents that generally trust most people and those that would be more careful. Most questions do not specify the population of other people, while some specify others in the same country. Some specify the neighbourhood or community. Responses that 'it depends' and midpoints on scales were recoded as 'be careful'. Table 3 summarises how other variables were recoded. 0 = be careful, 1 = trust others

at_002a | Social Trust

Generally speaking, would you say that most people can be trusted or that you can't be too careful in dealing with people? 0 = you must be very careful, 1 = most people can be trusted

at_002b | Social Trust

Generally speaking, do you think most people are trustworthy or not? 0 = most people are not trustworthy, 1 = most people are trustworthy

at_003a | Social Trust

Generally speaking, would you say that most people can be trusted, or that you can't be too careful in dealing with people? 0 = you can't be too careful, 1 = it depends, 2 = most people can be trusted

at_004a | Social Trust

How much do you trust each of the following types of people: other [country nationality]? 0 = not at all, 1 = just a little, 2 = I trust them somewhat, 3 = I trust them a lot

at_004b | Social Trust

Now, speaking of the people from here, would you say that people in this community or people from around here are generally very trustworthy, somewhat trustworthy, not very trustworthy or untrustworthy? 0 = untrustworthy, 1 = not very trustworthy, 2 = somewhat trustworthy, 3 = very trustworthy

at_004c | Social Trust

Generally speaking, would you say that people can be trusted or that you can't be too careful in dealing with people? 0 = you almost always can't be too careful in dealing with people, 1 = you usually can't be too careful in dealing with people, 2 = people can usually be trusted, 3 = people can almost always be trusted

at_004d | Social Trust

Would you say that most people can be trusted or you can't be too careful in dealing with people? 0 = usually need to be careful with people, 1 = sometimes need to be careful with people, 2 = sometimes can trust people, 3 = usually can trust people

at_005a | Social Trust

Generally speaking, would you say that most people can be trusted, or that you can't be too careful in dealing with people? 0 = you can't be too careful, 1, 2, 3, 4 = most people can be trusted

at_007a | Social Trust

To what extent do you trust: Most people in this country? 0 = no trust at all, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 = great trust

at_010a | Social Trust

Generally speaking, would you say that most people can be trusted, or that you can't be too careful in dealing with people? Uses a scale: 0 = you can't be too careful, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 = most people can be trusted

at_010b | Social Trust

Generally speaking, would you say that most people can be trusted or not? Please use a scale
Recoded: 0 = most people cannot be trusted, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 = most people can be trusted

at_011a | Social Trust

Using this card, generally speaking, would you say that most people can be trusted, or that you can't be too careful in dealing with people? Please tell me on a score of 0 to 10, where 0 means you can't be too careful and 10 means that most people can be trusted.

Satisfaction with Democracy

These survey items measure respondent satisfaction with the way democracy works in their country.

de_102 | Satisfaction with Democracy (Common)

This common variable indicates whether respondents are satisfied with the way their national democracy works. Neutral responses and midpoints on scales were recoded as 'not satisfied'. Table 4 summarises how other variables were recoded. 0 = not satisfied, 1 = satisfied

de_103a | Content with Democracy

What is your opinion about the democracy in [Country] and our whole political system? 0 = not content, 1 = somewhat content, 2 = very content

de_104a | Satisfaction with Democracy

In general, would you say you are very satisfied, satisfied, unsatisfied or very unsatisfied with the way democracy works in [Country]? 0 = very dissatisfied, 1 = dissatisfied, 2 = satisfied, 3 = very satisfied

de_104b | Satisfaction with Democracy

On the whole, how satisfied or dissatisfied are you with the way democracy works in [Country]. Are you ...? 0 = not at all satisfied, 1 = not very satisfied, 2 = fairly satisfied, 3 = very satisfied

de_104c | Satisfied with Democracy

Please tell me whether you agree or disagree with the following statement. Is that strongly or slightly? In general, I am satisfied with democracy. 0 = disagree strongly, 1 = disagree slightly, 2 = agree slightly, 3 = agree strongly

de_104d | Proud of Democracy

How proud are you of [Country] in each of the following: The way democracy works? 0 = not proud at all, 1 = not very proud, 2 = Somewhat proud, 3 = very proud

de_105a | Satisfaction with Democracy

Overall, how satisfied are you with the way democracy works in [Country]? 0 = [Country] is not a democracy, 1 = not at all satisfied, 2 = not very satisfied, 3 = fairly satisfied, 4 = very satisfied

de_105b | Satisfaction with Democracy

Please tell me how satisfied or dissatisfied you are with the following aspects of your life. The democratic system. 0 = very dissatisfied, 1 = somewhat dissatisfied, 2 = neither satisfied nor dissatisfied, 3 = somewhat satisfied, 4 = very satisfied

de_106a | Satisfaction with Democracy

Overall, how satisfied are you with the way democracy works in [Country]? 0 = [Country] is not a democracy, 1 = very dissatisfied, 2 = somewhat dissatisfied, 3 = neutral, 4 = somewhat satisfied, 5 = very satisfied

de_110a | Satisfied with Democracy

Are you completely satisfied or completely dissatisfied with the way in which democracy is working in [Country] today? 0 = completely dissatisfied, 9 = completely satisfied

de_110b | Democracy Satisfaction

On the whole, to what extent would you say you are satisfied with the way democracy works in [Country]? 0 = completely dissatisfied, 9 = completely satisfied

de_111a | Satisfaction with Democracy

And on the whole, how satisfied are you with the way democracy works in [Country]? 0 = extremely dissatisfied, 10 = extremely satisfied

de_111b | Functioning of Democracy

On the whole, on a scale of 0 to 10 where 0 is very poorly and 10 is very well: How well does democracy work in [Country] today? 0 = very poorly, 10 = very well

de_111c | Democracy Satisfaction

Now I would like you to indicate on this scale to what extent you are satisfied with your present situation in the following respects: The way democracy is functioning in [Country]? 0 = completely dissatisfied, 10 = completely satisfied

Support for Democracy

These survey items measure respondent support for democracy as a form of government.

de_202 | Support for Democracy (Common)

This common variable indicates when respondents find democracy preferable to other forms of government such as authoritarian or dictatorship governments. Responses indicating indifference and midpoints on scales were recoded as democracy being 'not always preferable'. Table 5 summarises how other variables were recoded. 0 = not always preferable, 1 = democracy preferable

Which kind of government do you prefer? 1 = dictatorship; 2 = democracy

de_203a | Support for Democracy

Which of these three statements is closest to your own opinion? 1 = in some circumstances, a non-democratic government can be preferable; 2 = for people like me, it doesn't matter what kind of government we have; 3 = democracy is preferable to any other kind of government.

de_203b | Democracy Best

Do you believe that democracy is the best form of government or is there another form of government which is better? 1 = other better, 2 = undecided, 3 = democracy best

de_204a | Support for Democracy

To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements? Democracy may have problems, but it's better than any other form of government. Both question versions use the same answers: 1 = strongly disagree, 2 = disagree, 3 = agree, 4 = strongly agree

de_205a | Support for Democracy

How strongly do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements? Democracy may have problems but it's better than any other form of government. 1 = strongly disagree, 2 = disagree, 3 = neither agree nor disagree, 4 = agree, 5 = strongly agree

de_207a | Support for Democracy

Democracy may have problems, but it is better than any other form of government. To what extent do you agree or disagree with this statement? Scale: 1 = strongly disagree to 7 = strongly agree

Perceived Electoral Integrity

These survey items measure respondent perceptions regarding the integrity of national elections.

de_302 | Perceived Electoral Integrity (Common)

This common variable indicates when respondents generally approve electoral integrity in their country. Most questions refer to national or parliamentary elections, but some do not specify the election type and some specify presidential elections. Surveys use different wording when referring to elections, such as trustworthy, honest, fair, or clean. Midpoint values on answer scales were recoded as 'disapprove'. Table 6 summarises how other variables were recoded. 0 = disapprove, 1 = approve.

de_302a | Clean Elections

Speaking generally, do you think that the elections in this country are clean or rigged? 0 = rigged, 1 = clean

de_302b | Free and Fair Elections

Do you feel that elections in this country are free and fair? 0 = no, 1 = yes

de_304a | Free and Fair Elections

On the whole, how would you rate the freeness and fairness of the last national election, held in [year]? 0 = not free and fair, 1 = free and fair, with major problems, 2 = free and fair, but with minor problems, 3 = completely free and fair

de_304b | Clean Elections

Do you believe that, generally speaking, elections are very clean, clean, fraudulent or very fraudulent? 0 = very fraudulent, 1 = fraudulent, 2 = clean, 3 = very clean

de_304c | Elections Conducted Fairly

Would you say that the most recent national election was conducted fairly or not? 0 = not at all fair, 1 = not very fair, 2 = to some extent fair, 3 = it was a fair election

de_305a | Clean Elections

In some countries people think that elections are clean; in other countries people think that elections are rigged. Thinking of the last elections, where would you place them in a five-step ladder, where 1 is clean and 5 is rigged? Recoded: 0 = rigged, 1, 2, 3, 4 = clean

de_305b | Fair Election Campaigning

Thinking of the last national election in [country], how fair was it regarding the opportunities of the candidates and parties to campaign? 0 = very unfair, 1 = somewhat unfair, 2 = neither fair nor unfair, 3 = somewhat fair, 4 = very fair

de_305c | Election Conducted Fairly

In some countries, people believe their elections are conducted fairly. In other countries, people believe that their elections are conducted unfairly. Thinking of the last election in [country], where would you place it on this scale of one to five where ONE means that the last election was conducted fairly and FIVE means that the last election was conducted unfairly? Recoded: 0 = last election was conducted unfairly, 1, 2, 3, 4 = last election was conducted fairly

de_307a | Trust Elections

To what extent do you trust elections in this country? 0 = not at all, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 = a lot

de_311a | Free and Fair Elections

Please tell me to what extent you think each of the following statements applies in [country]. National elections in [country] are free and fair. 0 = does not apply, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 = applies completely

de_336t | Electoral Integrity Score

In your view, how often do the following things occur in this country's elections? Votes are counted fairly; opposition candidates are prevented from running; TV news favours the governing party; voters are bribed; journalists provide fair coverage of elections; election officials are fair; rich people buy elections; voters are threatened with violence at the polls; voters are offered a genuine choice in the elections. Original answers: 1 = very often, 2 = fairly often, 3 = not often, 4 = not at all often. All nine questions were recoded from 0 to 3 such that higher values consistently represented higher electoral integrity. Answers were then averaged to produce a scale ranging from 0 to 3, where 0 = lowest electoral integrity and 3 = highest electoral integrity.

Country

These variables indicate the survey country, with values compared in Table 7.

id_100 | Country Code (Common)

This common variable uses three-digit numerical codes to represent countries. Values come from the International Standards Organization (ISO) 3166-1 numeric standard.

id_101 | Country Name (Common)

This common variable uses country names slightly modified from the English short names in the ISO 3166-2 standard.

id_103 | Country Alpha3 (Common)

This common variable uses three-letter alphabetic codes to represent countries. Most values come from the ISO 3166-1 alpha-3 standard, but a few are supplemented using the Correlates of War (COW) alpha-3 standard.

Year

This variable provides the year of the survey.

id_200 | Year (Common)

This common variable indicates the year of respondent interviews or surveys. It provides a four-digit year. Values were sometimes extracted from date variables or manually coded from technical documents.

Survey

These variables identify the public opinion survey.

id_300 | Survey Round (Common)

This common variable assigns a unique numerical identification code to each survey round, wave, module, or year. Value labels use abbreviated round names, as displayed in Table 8.

These survey items measure respondent education.

This common variable categorises respondents within three educational levels. These levels were sometimes estimated based on the age respondents stopped their education or the total years of education respondents indicated they had completed. The education levels of respondents still studying were estimated using age variables if available. The variable thus may not always be completely accurate where these estimates were necessary. Table 11 summarises how other variables were recoded. 1 = primary or lower, 2 = secondary or vocational, 3 = tertiary or higher.

Income

These survey items measure respondent income. Most measure household income.

The aim was for values to approximate the lowest 25%, middle 50%, and highest 25% within each country-survey observation. These exact percentages are not always achieved so the variable represents an approximate income grouping. 1 = lower Income, 2 = middle income, 3 = higher income
